"Live Long and Prosper"

Leonard Nimoy died last Friday. Leonard Nimoy was known around the world for his acting career in the character role of Mr Spock from the Star Trek science fiction television and movie productions. Mr Spock was a "Vulcan", an alien from another planet who had a signature hand action. Whenever he left a group or a situation, Mr Spock would hold up his right hand and say, "live long and prosper".

I am in awe at how the Star Trek series took off, not only in the scientific community but across the general population as well. If you ever get to watch the original series you will see awfully choreographed fight scenes and big rocks that fell and bounced in the background because they were actually rubber props. The production was definitely “B grade” or lower.

But Star Trek became more and more popular and has recently seen more blockbuster success with movies released in the 21st Century. Few productions from the 1960s have that kind of achievement. Why is it so? Star Trek looks at deep themes of human life: hope for the future; working together; struggle with moral and ethical dilemmas. As the series developed over the decades, Star Trek delved more and more deeply into religious themes.

Leonard Nimoy once revealed that he modelled his signature hand action and words, “live long and prosper”, on an ancient Jewish blessing. It is more than a coincidence, that an ancient blessing would become so appropriate for a science fiction, futuristic Star Trek. We all need to look ahead with hope. We need to find purpose and good meaning in life. Star Trek was good entertainment whilst tapping into the human yearnings we all have for deep meanings.

This makes Star Trek a good entry into the life and work of Jesus of Nazareth who once said, “I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly”. That is something like, “live long and prosper”.

From the Head of Senior School Students

Service Learning

An important component in the development of students is inspiring them to adopt a sense of civic responsibility with the communities they live in. Volunteering their time in assisting others is a pursuit that will immensely benefit their personal growth and lifelong experiences. A number of students took part in the ANZAC Day service last year and we encourage students to participate again this year. Information about this event will be communicated in the coming weeks.

Each term, there are college-focused connections to charities. On 20th March one of our Year 10 students, Jessica Keenan, will be participating in the World’s Greatest Shave and has been raising money for the Leukaemia Foundation.

Jessica will deliver the following speech at our International Women’s Day breakfast this Friday, themed ‘Make it Happen’:

Good morning everyone. My name is Jessica Keenan and I am just one in over 150,000 people shaving or colouring their hair for this year’s World Greatest Shave. I have chosen to shave my hair because I feel that it is a small price to pay to keep families together during treatment and to help support the research into finding a cure for blood cancers. This is where the money I will raise will go. The World’s Greatest Shave is organised by the Leukaemia Foundation and it is their biggest fundraiser. The money goes to ‘Vision to Cure’, which is the research arm and they hope to one day find a cure to blood cancers. The money raised also goes to ‘Mission of Care’, which provides families with a range of services during treatment (like transport, accommodation and relocation if needed). The foundations do not receive government funding and they rely heavily on support from the community to fund Vision to Cure and Mission to care.

Today, it is reported that 31 people in Australia will be diagnosed with Leukaemia, Myeloma or Lymphoma. This means over 12,000 Australian a year get blood cancers. More people die from this cancer than Breast Cancer and Melanoma. Because of the Leukaemia Foundation’s work, more than 80% of children survive Leukaemia, but the treatment isn’t pleasant. One of my mum’s staff members died a few years ago from Leukaemia and this is why I am supporting this cause.

The goal for this year’s World’s Greatest Shave is to raise \$20 million. My goal is to raise \$570 and if you would like to help me reach this please feel free to put a donation in my tin or you can go the World’s Greatest Shave website and click on the sponsor link and then type in my name.

Thank you for helping me support the Leukaemia Foundation so we may one day be able to find a cure for these blood cancers.

From the Head of Staff and Students P-5

Watching the news recently, it struck me that media emphasis and so much of what happens in our lives is focused on what is wrong in the world with little or no mention of what is right. How does this emphasis on unhappiness impact on our lives?

According to the Friends for Life program, "anxiety disorders represent the most common form of psychological distress in childhood and youth". Research has consistently found high rates of anxiety disorders in children and youth:

- 8 year olds 25.7%.
- 12 year olds 15.7%.
- 17 year olds 21.4%.

Although specific figures differ, gender differences appear to exist for the reported levels of anxiety disorders.

Research shows happy, resilient and confident children show increased academic performance, interact positively with their peers and function more effectively as caring, helpful and supportive human beings.

One recurring characteristic of people who are happy (or have inner peace and contentment) is the feeling of being grateful and appreciative for what is around them. This is a characteristic we could all well cultivate, for it changes how we feel.

How can we develop this in our daily lives? Some time ago I started the practice of ending each day by recalling and writing down something to be grateful for that occurred during the day. Sometimes it takes a bit of time to think of something, but every day I find something to be grateful or thankful for.

Subsequently, I have found that being grateful has the power of changing your mood from negative to positive almost instantly. Good feelings and positive energy arise when you start acknowledging what you are grateful for.

Expressing gratitude each day not only helps you to feel good straight away, and to sleep better, but it can also help you to soften your resistance about challenging situations. Including your thankfulness in prayer adds extra depth and meaning to the experience.

Conditions of Enrolment

The number of students learning instruments and studying vocal technique is already higher than this time last year. While most students are very conscientious at attending their tuition, we would like to emphasise the conditions of enrolment.

1. Students are required to commit to the program for a minimum of one (1) semester.
2. Students need to bring all necessary equipment to lessons.

3. Students will maintain their instruments in playing condition.
4. Students will practice at regular intervals to maximise their learning experience.
5. Students will be invited to join college bands and ensembles on reaching an appropriate standard.
6. All students in an ensemble will be expected to attend all rehearsals and performances at which they have been requested to play.
7. Invoices for required number of lessons will be issued at the end of Term 1 and the commencement of each term thereafter.
8. On receipt of the Invoice, full payment is required within two (2) weeks.
9. Students/parents must notify the teacher 24 hours prior to any planned absences so an alternative lesson time can be arranged. However, if a student falls ill on their lesson day, the office should be notified and a message left for their tutor by 8.30am. No credits or catch up lessons will be given for lessons missed without prior notification to the teacher.
10. To withdraw from the program, one (1) months' notice prior to the end of the school semester should be given in writing.

Pacific Soccer

Start of 2015 Season

The wait is over and at last the 2015 season is kicking off this weekend. Our 17 Pacific Soccer teams will be able to take to the field, as games commence across the coast.

Our U6-U10 teams will play in a Rooball carnival; with each team playing at least three shortened games on the day.



Pacific Soccer will be hosting some U6 games, which will see our U6 Razors and U6 Seadragons playing at home.



Our other Rooball teams will be playing at Bli Bli (U6 Flyers, U9 Eels, U10 Taipans, U10 Cobras), at Chancellor (U7 Fireflies, U7 Barracudas), at Unity (U7 Jewelfish, U7 Vipers), at Siena (U8 Swordfish, U8 Seals) and at Caloundra (U8 Stingrays).

A few quick reminders regarding the Rooball carnivals:

- There is a \$5 fee per player for the carnival, which will be collected by the manager of each team. This fee is for the carnival only and no other game fees will be charged for the regular games throughout the season.
- Players will receive a ribbon at the end of their third game.
- Managers, please note that only one team sheet needs to be filled in for the day, which must include your team details and each player on the team.
- It is forecast to be 30 degrees on Saturday, so please bring a water bottle.

Our U11+ competitive teams will play their first of three grading games this weekend.
