Daily Bread

The King is Crowned!

It is almost Easter. We will have a holiday and Christians around the world will celebrate a coronation – Jesus is placed on the throne of His cross, having been given a crown of thorns. He is then raised up high for people to see and the world has been a different place ever since.

Just a week before this 'coronation' there was another kind of 'royal event'. We call it the Palm Sunday Procession into Jerusalem. Processions into their city were a well-known feature of urban life for the local people in Jerusalem. Processions were the way kings and other rulers entered your place, with shouting and singing from the gathered crowds.

Just a week before his crucifixion, the people cheered Jesus as He rode into the city. But this procession was quite different to the ones that people were used to. No royal welcome was there for Jesus. His was only accompanied by His disciples, not soldiers and war horses. There were also mysterious elements in this procession. This Jesus was a famous preacher and miracle worker, riding on a donkey with people spreading palm branches and cloaks before him, all the while shouting 'Hosanna'. These mysteries directly connect Jesus with the expected 'messiah' who would come to be the saviour of the people. This made this event into the procession of all processions.

Although, the people may have expected some other warrior king, they were given the humble king who would go to the cross to suffer and die for the sin of the world. Although the people may have expected a conqueror who would defeat the Roman Empire and free the people, they were given the humble king who conquers death and the devil and opens the way for us to live in peace with God.

The humble king Jesus still calls us to follow Him, to march under his banner of forgiveness and reconciliation. Thank God that Christians have joined this procession down through the centuries, to bring God's blessing to the world.

"Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord."

"A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of Jesus and that followed were shouting, 'Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!' When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, 'Who is this?'" (Matthew 21)

Recently, whilst on duty in the car park, I asked a young student if he had his hat with him. He replied rather sheepishly that he had left it at home. I reminded him that he needed a hat at lunch break and that if he did not bring it to school he would not be able to play on the oval. His dad who was helping other children get out of his car thanked me for questioning his son. He, like many parents, is working towards making his son more independent and responsible for himself.

As parents we are all naturally protective of our children however, if we want our children to become independent, resilient, confident individuals it is important that they be given the opportunities to be responsible. Carrying school bags, answering questions themselves and remembering hats and uniforms are all simple tasks which can lead to developing responsible individuals. If children are to become independent and responsible we need to provide the opportunities for them to demonstrate independence and responsibility.

Before and After School Supervision

Parents are reminded that playground supervision commences at 8.00am each morning. Children who are dropped at school before 8.00am need to be placed in outside school hour's care - unless parents have previously contacted the college to discuss alternative arrangements.

Parents are also asked to ensure that children are not unsupervised on verandahs or on play equipment after 3.30pm each afternoon. From 3.30pm these areas are only registered for the children attending after school hour's care.

Peanuts and Nut Products

A number of students in the Prep – Year 5 section of the college suffer from a variety of food allergies including allergies to seafood (fish), insect bites, eggs and particularly peanuts and nut products. I would like to remind parents that

the college encourages children to not bring nuts or nut products and seafood in lunches. Some of our students can experience a life threatening reaction if exposed to these food items. In some cases, simple skin contact with nut products can cause a severe reaction. I would remind parents to advise your child's teacher if your child suffers from food allergies or any medical condition.

From the Head of Teaching and Learning Middle College

PACE

Have you ever wondered how electrical energy can be generated, captured and channelled? Our PACE (Pacific Academic Challenge and Enrichment) Science students in Year 6 and 7 have. They have worked busily this term with their mentor, Mrs Claire Richards, to grow their understanding of energy through the lens of electronic circuits. Students have engaged in experiments that have helped them to develop and test their growing knowledge and will make their own complex circuit to demonstrate their mastery of the concepts they have explored.

Fifteen Year 8 and 9 PACE Maths students have also worked with Mrs Richards and have been engrossed in cryptology. Students have explored the practice of making and breaking codes and how these link to real life applications such as ATM cards, computer passwords and electronic commerce and national security. This exploration brings together Maths, Computing and Electrical engineering.

NAPLAN

This year, NAPLAN testing will take place on Tuesday, 12th May, Wednesday, 13th May and Thursday, 14th May. Language conventions and writing are administered on the first day of testing, Day 2 involves the reading paper and numeracy testing happens on the final day. Where students are absent on test days, they can undertake catch up papers on the day of their return up to and including Friday, 15th May. The writing paper stimulus this year will be the same for Year 3 and 5 and another stimulus sheet will be used for the Year 7 and 9 cohorts. The writing test could ask students to write a narrative or persuasive response. Schools and students will not know this details until the test.

Year 3-12 Cross Country - 2nd April

Next week (Thursday, 2nd April), all Year 3-12 students will be participating in the Cross Country Carnival. Students will compete in age groups from 8 years through to open boys/girls. The 8 years – 12 years events will take place from 10.45am to 1.00pm and the 13 years – open races will take

place from approximately 1.30pm – 3.00pm. Year 7 students who are turning 13 this year will need to race with the secondary college students from 1.30pm.

This year, in the 13 years – open age divisions, we will be running the carnival in a slightly different format. There will be two events on the day.

There is a Championship Event, which involves those who are serious runners who want to compete for Age Championship medallions, a spot in the school team and for extra house points. There are big points up for grabs to all who compete in this race. 1st receives 30 points, 2nd 25 points, all the way down to 9th – 15th receiving five points. Each house MUST field 5 runners from each age group and gender. This event will be run as one single race, but scored per age group.

There is also the House Participation Event, whereby ALL other students who are not running in the Championship Event will run a 3km course. The first house that gets a certain number of runners across the line will receive 100 house points (2nd gets 75 and 3rd gets 50). Then, all other runners who cross the line within 25 minutes will also receive a house point. Therefore, it is important that ALL students participate and run to the best of their ability.

It is compulsory for all students to attend and participate in the Cross Country Carnival.

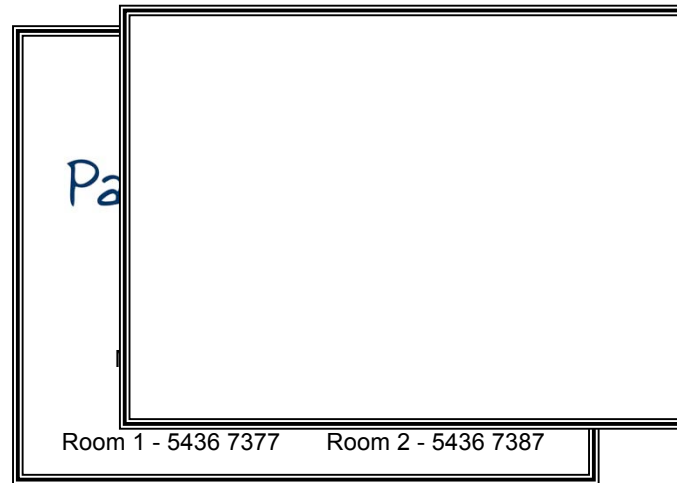
