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## Principal's Log

Families will receive a copy of their child's individual NAPLAN results with an accompanying letter early next week. There were strong individual student performances throughout all year levels. All cohorts performed above, and in many instances well above, state means for all aspects of the test. Cohort performances were also above, and again in a number of instances well above, national means with the exception of Year 3 spelling, which was above the state mean but just below the national mean. The Year 9 cohort performed well above the national and state means in writing, spelling and numeracy and the Year 5 cohort in reading, spelling and numeracy. The Year 7 cohort performed considerably above the national mean in writing, reading and numeracy while the Year 3 cohort were above state means and just above national means for writing, punctuation and grammar and numeracy and considerably above for reading. These were

good performances for each of the cohorts and we look forward to making good use of the early release of data to identify areas for improvement on a cohort and individual basis.



The Year 9 students are enjoying their weeklong camp experience where they learn to thrive in the outdoors with minimal equipment. As one of the culminating experiences of their Rite Journey, it provides the opportunity to strengthen

their understanding of themselves and others and enjoy the beauty of the outdoors. There is time for guided reflection, which supports them to grow spiritually. It is a time of deep growth for all.

Where possible, families are encouraged to support the Maryborough Bike Challenge Team as they raise funds for Motor Neurone Disease through their participation in the Human Powered Vehicle Competition. It is heartening to see young people combining their involvement in a competition with the opportunity to support research into such a debilitating disease. Thank you to Zarraffa's Coffee who has made a significant contribution.

We look forward to the Science Fair next Tuesday, which will enable students to showcase their learnings as they have explored light. The whole day fair will provide the opportunity for young people to be inspired by each other's investigations as well as a variety of activities. We thank Mrs Lu Pollard and Mrs Shelley Hogan for their leadership of the event and look forward to having our minds lit up!

This Sunday, the Year 4 cohort will be assisting in the installation of Pastor Paul Smith as Bishop of the Lutheran Church of Australia, Queensland District. We thank Mr Doug Fitzpatrick and Mr Terry Clark for their support of the Year 4 students. The installation will be held at St Peter's Lutheran Church in Indooroopilly and will commence at 2.00pm. ### Restorative Practices

Last Friday I had the pleasure of representing the college at an in-service regarding Restorative Practices. It was great to hear how other schools are implementing Restorative Practices and also share Pacific's approach.

At the college, when addressing any problem between students, we focus on a restorative approach, developing resilience in students and instilling a culture that promotes support between students.

The Restorative Approach, starts with the following three questions:

- What happened?
- Who has been harmed?
- What needs to happen to repair some of that harm?

With this approach, the focus is on the harm that has been done and the obligation of those responsible to 'right the wrong' as much as possible. It is an approach that develops an understanding of the harm the wrongdoer's behaviour has caused to others so they can try to make amends. In this way, it is an educative approach.

It also ensures that those who have been most affected by the wrongdoing have the opportunity to be involved in rectifying the issue and moving forward. The approach aims to educate students towards self-regulated, correct behaviour that is respectful to all parties concerned.

As a footnote, research now clearly highlights that short-term 'solutions' alone, like punishing the wrongdoing student, do not improve the relationships and other social factors between students.

## From the Director of Students

It is important to regularly revisit the Restorative Practices that are used every day by staff at Pacific. This is a whole college approach to promoting resilience and helps to build positive relationships in the school community. It is focused on helping young people become aware of the impact their behaviour has on others through personal accountability and learning from a conflict situation. An important component of Restorative Practices is the focus on restoring the relationships when they break down.

Over time at Pacific, we have seen that the consistent use of Restorative Practices has changed attitudes and represent a philosophical shift in thinking. Student wellbeing and learning are inseparable from constructive relationships. If students have meaningful and positive relations with adults and each other, they are more likely to engage in learning and stay connected to school. So, forming positive relationships within the school community is essential to learning and connection.

Cyber safety is another subject that requires great vigilance. On Tuesday 8<sup>th</sup> September, the Office of Child Safety will be giving a presentation to Year 7-10 students on this important topic. This will be followed by a staff presentation after school and also a parent evening. This will be an important part of how we work together to keep the community cyber safe.

Finally, Ms Annie Williams the College Counsellor and I are working with Dr Peter McMahon to review the Personal Development curriculum. From next year, Mindstar will be completed in Personal Development classes and we are also updating programs with new resources.

### 2016 Tertiary Course Updates

Year 12 students are reminded that they need to keep checking the QTAC website for changes to the 2016 university programs. The changes could include new courses, new pre-requisites, withdrawn courses or new course names. Below are just a few of the recent changes.

**Australian Catholic University (ACU):** The Bachelor of Biomedical Science and its associated dual degrees has prerequisites of English (4, SA) and Maths B (4, SA) not any combination of Maths A, B or C (4,SA).

**University of Queensland (UQ):** The following new courses at the Gatton Campus will have prerequisites of English (4,SA) and Maths A or B (4,SA):

- Bachelor of Equine Studies and Bachelor of Agribusiness / Equine Studies.
- Bachelor of Wildlife Science and Bachelor of Agribusiness / Wildlife Science.
- Bachelor of Sustainable Agriculture and Bachelor of Agribusiness / Sustainable Agriculture.
- Bachelor of Veterinary Technology and Bachelor of Agribusiness / Veterinary Technology.

At the St Lucia Campus, the new Bachelor of Mathematics, will be a three-year program that offers majors in Applied Mathematics, Data Analytics and Operation Research, Mathematical Physics, Pure Mathematics and Statistics. Dual qualifications with Arts, Commerce, Economics, Education (Secondary), Science and Engineering are also available. The prerequisites are English (4, SA) and Maths B (4, SA).

The new Bachelor of Advanced Finance and Economics (Honours) program at St Lucia is aimed at high achieving school leavers with strong mathematics and language skills. There will be approximately 50 places available in Semester 1, 2016. The prerequisites are English (4, Sa) and Maths B (4, SA).

**Queensland University of Technology (QUT):** The Bachelor of Pharmacy is now part of the OP Guarantee Scheme. Under this scheme, students who get an OP 1-5 (Rank 93 or better) are guaranteed an offer of a place in the major offer round.

A new course at QUT in 2016 will be the Bachelor of Human Services / Business dual degree. This skill combination will provide more job opportunities across the public and private sectors.

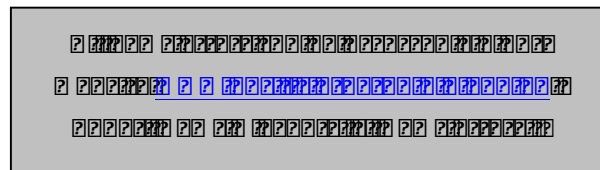
