Did you read that they have released the details of the Will of Mr Nelson Mandela, past president of South Africa and

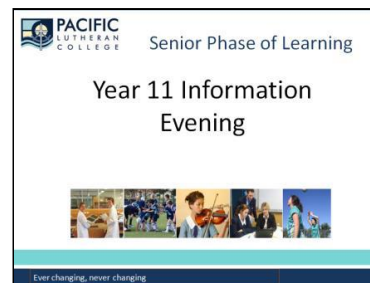

P-5 Parent Class Representatives

The success of the educational journey at Pacific involves positive relationships between staff, parents and students. To further enhance and develop these important links between parents and the college, this week a letter will be sent home asking for expressions of interest from parents who would be prepared to act as class representatives in the P-5 section of the college. You Can Do It Program

During Term 1, the focus of the program in all P-5 year levels is on "Getting Along" with others. Getting along relates to generating habits of mind, promoting - Being Tolerant of Others, Thinking First, Playing by the Rules and Accepting Social Responsibility.

Getting along is revealed when students work cooperatively with each other, resolve conflicts by discussion rather than displays of aggression, manage their anger, show tolerance of others and follow important class rules. Over the next few weeks we will be unpacking each of the habits of mind at assemblies. Peanuts and Nut Products

A number of students in the P-5 section of the college suffer from a variety of food allergies including allergies to seafood (including fish), insect bites, eggs and particularly peanuts and

Some students attending the college can experience a life threatening reaction if exposed to these food items. The Cambodia Project

Students in Years 10-12 are now invited to submit applications to be members of the team who will travel to Cambodia in December of this year.

Pacific has established a relationship with the *Rainbow Hostel*, which is run by Lutheran World Mission to provide safe and affordable accommodation for university students in Phnom Penh. The Lutheran Church of Australia sponsors the hostel, which provides a home for students who otherwise would not be able to afford to live and study in Phnom Penh. Students at the hostel have also initiated, and continue to expand, livelihood training projects such as agricultural training and English classes.

A team of students, parents and staff will travel to Cambodia between the 7th and 21st December 2014 (exact dates are subject to flight schedules). During this time, the team will spend time in fellowship with the hostel students and visit and learn about a variety of other development projects in Phnom Penh, Kampong Chhnang and Siem Reap. In order to learn more about the history and culture of Cambodia, the team will visit significant sites such as the Killing Fields at Choeung Ek, the Tuol Sleng Genocide Museum and the temples of Angkor.

Ten students will have the opportunity to travel to Cambodia: up to five from Year 12, up to five from Year 11 and two Year 10 students, who must be at least 15 years of age upon departure for Cambodia. The cost is around \$3,500, with participants needing to fully fund this cost.

Throughout the year, the team will work with the Pacific community to foster awareness about the hostel and other projects and to raise financial support for these initiatives.

Application packs are available from Ms Karen Schultz in the S6 staffroom. Applications close on Friday, 21st February and the team will be finalised by the end of Term 1. Please feel free to contact me if you have any queries about the project.

Parents as Career Transition Support Program

The *Parents as Career Support Transition (PACTS) Program*, a National Career Development strategy, was launched in 2013 to further the career development of young people. It was developed in recognition of the significant impact that parents have on career and transition decisions of their children. It aims to reach those parents who have limited knowledge to support their children through key transitional points.

The PACTS program equips parents to support their children and teenagers to make informed choices. The program is tailored to the needs of different cohorts of families at specific transition points, and aims to increase parents' confidence. The emphasis of PACTS is on increasing access to knowledge about careers and transitions and also about learning how to have positive and informed conversations with young people about their transition choices and options.

PACTS targets small groups of parents and supportive adults through three interactive workshops facilitated by trained and professional PACTS facilitators.

Workshop 1 is "Beginning to Explore".

Workshop 2 is "Career and Transition Services".

Workshop 3 is "Jobs".

These workshops will be held at the college later this year.

As the Career Counsellor at Pacific, I will be participating in a two day interactive PACTS Facilitator Training Seminar on the 19th and 20th March at the University of the Sunshine Coast. On Day 2 of the Facilitator Training, I am able to invite two parents to an afternoon / morning express session (two hours).

1. CAREER INTERVIEWS

Year 12 students will be attending the annual University Showcase at the University of the Sunshine Coast during Periods 3 to 5 on Wednesday, 5th March.

This is a compulsory part of the Career Education program for the Year 12 to assist them with their decision making for their post-Year 12 options.

A "Parent Information" notice about the excursion and the "Student Medical and Consent Form" will be distributed to the students next week.

3. THE PARENTS AS CAREER TRANSITION SUPPORT PROGRAM
