With these sayings, Jesus leads us to consider deeper lasting qualities in life and to look away from superficial fixes. He

invites us to find ways to come to God and ask for help for ourselves, our world and for the people around us. He invites us to find ways to daily thank God for providing what we need from day to day.

When we walk each day in the presence of our gracious God any troubles and concerns that come our way take on a whole new meaning. The true blessing is God’s presence with us and God’s promise to be our helper in all times of need.

### Allergy Awareness Week

Allergy Awareness Week will be held from Monday, 12<sup>th</sup> – Sunday, 18<sup>th</sup> May. At Pacific in Prep - Year 5, we have a number of students who can suffer from life threatening allergic reactions when exposed to peanuts or nut products. A number of students also can suffer severe allergic reactions caused by other allergens, including insect bites and a variety of other food products. In the case of peanuts and nut products, avoidance of the food trigger is the only way to prevent a reaction. With the increased emergence of serious allergic reactions amongst children, this issue impacts on the entire college community. It is requested that parents do not send nut or peanut products of any kind to school with their children. Examples of products that contain peanuts are: Peanut Butter / Paste, Nutella, Peanut Bars and some muesli bars and health bars. Please read food labeling to ensure that foods sent to school do not contain peanuts.

### Walk Safely to School Day

Walk Safely to School Day (WSTSD) is an annual, national event when all primary school children will be encouraged to walk and commute safely to school. This year, all students at Pacific are encouraged to participate in this event. The walk is a community event seeking to promote Road Safety, Health, Public Transport and the Environment. By walking to school, you will get some great exercise and quality time with friends, as well as reducing traffic congestion and pollution around the school.

**It will be held throughout Australia on Friday, 23<sup>rd</sup> May.**

If possible, parents are invited to join with their children in walking (or riding if you live too far away to walk) all or part of the way from home to school on Friday, 23<sup>rd</sup> May.

### All Orders And Payment Are To Be Made On-Line

On-line payment is the preferred method by the photographers. Envelopes are not to be returned to school. Please keep them at home for your reference (except for sibling order forms).

The photographers have an automated system for payments by credit card. You can go online to [www.advancedlife.com.au](http://www.advancedlife.com.au) for easy to understand payment instructions. You will receive a receipt number which **MUST** be written on the order envelope in the space provided.

If paying by cash or cheque, envelope and payment is to be returned to the admin office. It is imperative they are returned by **Wednesday, 14th May**. Each child must have a completed envelope, even if you are paying for more than one student in one envelope. Envelopes are not to be placed inside other envelopes. Student order/family envelopes found placed inside other order envelopes will often result in that student missing their portraits as they will not be discovered until after the day of photography.

### Filling Out Your Envelope

**“Year Group”** is eg 8 or 3 etc, not 2014 or whatever.

## Personal Development Program

Year 12 students continue preparing for the QCS Test in each of their two lessons a week. The students are receiving a solid grounding in all aspects of the tests they will sit in September. Year 11 students are close to completing their Apply First Aid (formerly Senior First Aid) course. They are currently going through the practical tests involved in CPR and Incident Management.

Mrs Ainslie Reid (Careers Adviser) has been working with each of the Year 10 classes assisting the students to complete their Set Plans. The Set Plans are compulsory for all students in Queensland to complete. Parents and Year 10 students will use these when choosing subjects for Years 11 and 12 later in 2014. The Set Plan is adjusted annually as the students re-align what career they would like to pursue.

Year 9 Rite Journey classes are investigating what roles the community expects them to have as they move through to adulthood. Topics include Acceptable Behaviours, Manners, Gender Identity and Differences, How the Media Represents Males and Females, Anger Management and Assertive Behaviours.

Year 8 students have begun a 'Friends for Life' unit. They will be investigating what a real friend does, positive self-esteem and having the ability to bounce back after experiencing setbacks. They have also reviewed their first term and the challenges that they faced. Their teachers are assisting them with setting up homework and study planners for the term.






