## From the Director of Students

On the last assembly of Term 2, I spoke to students about the importance of getting away from their screens and enjoying some time outside in the natural environment. It is important that young people have a good balance in their lives and living in a beautiful place, with an excellent climate such as the Sunshine Coast, gives them a wonderful opportunity to get out doors. Today, technology is part of young people's educational, social and entertainment lives.

Do you know how much time your child spent on technology over the holidays? There is growing evidence that technology can play a positive role in the social and educational worlds of young minds. However, there are causes for concern, such as, with many of the games young people play. The National Youth Violence Prevention Resource Centre reported that of the 70 top selling video games in 41%, violence was necessary for gamers to achieve goals. In 17%, violence was the primary focus of the game itself.

Michigan State University research shows that violent gaming activates the area of the brain for aggressive cognition and affect. When young people played violent games, there was less activity in areas of the brain related to thinking, learning reasoning and emotional control.

As parents, we need to realise that technology is here for the long haul with benefits and risks. We need to observe and guide our child's gaming and on-line behaviour. Some types of excessive technology used, such as gaming, does interfere with learning, social relationships, mental health and possibly cognitive development. Therefore, it is important to set clear and achievable goals for our children when it comes to use of technology and to also remind them of the joys of riding a bike, playing a ball sport in the park and enjoying the beautiful clean Sunshine Coast beaches.

Welcome to the new term. I hope all families spent a relaxing and enjoyable time together over the holidays. This term is particularly busy and filled with a number of important events,

### You Can Do it

This term in Prep - Year 5, the focus for the *You Can Do It* program relates to developing Persistence and the habits of mind related to Working Tough, Giving Effort and developing an "I can do it" attitude. Persistence means trying hard and not giving up when something feels like it is too hard to do.

Examples of persistent behavior include:

- Continuing to try even when work is hard,
- Not being distracted by others,
- Checking work when it is finished.

Often students need to experience what it feels like to succeed if they are to be successful in the future. Success or achievement does not come without effort and persistence. Success is not about reaching a particular level of achievement rather it is for each individual achieving their individual potential. Parents can support and develop persistence in their children by always encouraging effort and recognising success.

The concept of Persistence fits neatly with developing positive types of thinking skills. The *You Can Do It* program not only fosters the development of thinking, it supports children in achieving to the best of their ability and aids them in developing social and emotional well-being and emotional resilience.

### Hats

A hat is an important piece of the college uniform. It is great to see many of the students out on the ovals or playing in the grounds during breaks. Each student is required to wear a hat at breaks and when travelling to and from school. I would ask all parents to encourage and remind all students to wear a hat to school every day.

### Uniforms

Students in Years 1 - 5 may only wear their sports uniform to school on the days they have HPE. Year 4 and 5 students may also wear their HPE uniforms to school on Thursdays. There may also be rare occasions during the year when students may be requested to wear their sports uniform to school for carnivals or excursions. On all other occasions, students should attend school in their formal uniform. I realise that on occasions students have to wear the wrong shoes or uniform to school.

If for some reason your child is unable to wear the correct uniform to school, please send a note to your child's class teacher advising them of the reason for wearing the wrong

uniform. A uniform reminder letter will be forwarded to parents whose children are in the wrong uniform without a note being forwarded to their child's class teachers.

ANZAC Centenary marks 100 years since Australia's involvement in the First World War and, in 2015, there will be a large number of activities commemorating 100 years since the ANZAC Gallipoli landing.

From its association with poppies flowering in the spring of 1915 on the battlefields of Belgium, France and Gallipoli, the poppy has become a symbol of both great loss in war and hope for those left behind.

As part of the 2015 ANZAC Commemoration, the 5,000 Poppies project will be "planting" a field of more than 25,000 poppies in Federation Square Melbourne as a stunning visual tribute to Australian servicemen and women for more than a century of service in all wars, conflicts and peacekeeping operations.
