### Was Jesus Ever a Young Person?

We know about Jesus as an adult worker, but was He ever a teenager like the teenagers of today? Although He did not live in a time of iPods and the Internet, He had to travel through that time of development from childhood to adulthood. We simply have almost no reference in the Bible to His time of growing up. There is only one story about Him talking in the temple in Jerusalem, amazing the great teachers with His knowledge of God.

Down through the ages, scholars have puzzled over why there is no reference to His years as a child and as a teenager. No good answers explain why. I believe that this mysterious silence about the "boy Jesus" is a great consolation for young people growing up. What is that consolation? There is no 'standard' for a young person to be shown, of the ideal young

person. Because we do not know about the 'boy Jesus', no one can say to a young person, "See what the boy Jesus was like? You should be like that too!!" Rather we celebrate the journey through childhood and teenage years and encourage young people to be all that they have been created to be.

But then, there is that one thing. Jesus knew about God and grew in God's care. This is central in the story of Jesus, for each young person today. Each of us need to learn about God's love and care for us. Each of us need to learn what it is to turn away from sin and evil and seek the way of God. At the core of Pacific Lutheran College, is the message that Jesus Christ is the way the truth and the life who brings us salvation and the forgiveness of sin.

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## From the Head of Staff and Students P-5

At last Friday's chapel the theme, so well presented by Year 3G, revolved around the concept of how individually each of us can make a difference. A way that we all can have a positive influence on our environment is through managing how much waste we generate and how we dispose of the waste we create. The old adage of act locally think globally succinctly describes how our individual actions can have positive global outcomes.

**Next week throughout the Junior College a new system for recycling waste will be introduced, both in the playground and in the classroom. In each eating area, bins will be available for organic waste, recyclable waste and non-recyclable waste. In classrooms, two bins will be provided for recyclable waste and non-recyclable waste. Initially an audit of how much organic waste is generated weekly will be carried out. This will be done to investigate the feasibility of installing an OCSA (On Site Composting Apparatus) which turns organic waste into clean, usable compost.**

The amount of non-recyclable rubbish generated at the college is large. Much of this rubbish is generated from food wrapping associated with student's lunches. Much of this rubbish is plastic which does not readily break down and, at this stage, is non-recyclable. Unfortunately these items can end up being washed into the ocean or being sent to landfill.

I would encourage parents to consider this when preparing food for lunches and morning teas. As a parent, I appreciate the convenience of snap lock plastic bags, plastic food wraps and fruit juice packed in tetra packs with attached straws wrapped in plastic and food presented in plastic bags.

Even though the students generally do a great job in keeping the grounds clean by placing litter in bins, unfortunately not all litter is placed or remains in bins.

There are alternatives for replacing much of the plastic used in lunches. Although the use of paper bags is not ideal, paper is certainly preferable to plastic. Re-usable stainless steel water bottles to carry juice in and stainless steel cutlery can be used instead of plastic ones. Re-washable Tupperware like containers are great for storing fruit, yoghurt, spaghetti and my favorite baked beans. There is some most informative information on the internet regarding making eco-friendly lunches. Sites such as <http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=CJ9FXCbyUBM> provide

practical ideas on making school lunches more environmentally friendly.

If every child's lunch (in years Prep - Year 5) contained one less piece of plastic per day, this would equate to over 50,000 pieces of rubbish being removed from the environment annually. Remember every little bit helps.

### Prep - Year 2 Car Park

Before school each morning, the car park can become congested. Often students are alighting from vehicles and moving through the car park. To ensure their safety, parents are reminded not to park in the drop off zones on the Prep or eastern side of the car park. Parking in the drop off zones causes increased congestion as parents attempt to drop off or pick up their children whilst stopped on the roadway. Drivers are also reminded to follow signage and road markings and the directions of staff on duty. Your assistance in keeping our students safe and lessening stress and congestion in the car park is most appreciated.

### Day for Daniel

Friday, 31<sup>st</sup> October is 'Day for Daniel Day'. As parents, we are all familiar with Daniel's story and appreciate the great work his parents have done through the Daniel Morcombe Foundation. At the P-5 assembly over the next two weeks, I will be reminding students of the need to be safe when travelling to and from school. This message is centred upon reminding students not to get into cars or go with strangers. There are numerous excellent resources available on-line (see below for examples) to support this important message of child safety.

## Food for Thought


### 10 Scientifically Proven Ways to Be Incredibly Happy

## A Symbol for the Past for the Future



There is a new tree at Pacific! Have you noticed the Bunya tree just to the east of the main gate? It is under one of the small signs.

### When?

The tree was planted on the last Friday chapel at the end of last term at a special ceremony.

### Why?

This tree was planted to celebrate the first formal public school building in Queensland. The Lutheran mission to the local indigenous people was started in Nundah 175 years ago and those faithful people build that first school.

### What?

The tree is a Bunya tree. The college asked what tree would be especially significant to the local indigenous people who were the focus of that first Lutheran school. The Bunya is a special tree and you can go online to find registries of the Bunyas in our region.

(Is the tree a hazard with bunya nuts? The Manawee Garden Centre in Buderim, which was the source for the tree, advises that the Bunyas can be maintained in such a way to prevent any hazard).

### Who?

Long-service Pacific Lutheran College Council members, Mr Peter Hovey and Mr Russell Kleidon planted this tree before the assembly of the whole college.
