Among many other benefits, ‘downtime’ is important for mental processes that affirm our identity, facilitate the development of an understanding of human behaviour and enable the development of our moral compass.

The importance of rest is highlighted in the Bible in the creation story. On the seventh day, God rested. The Old Testament and the commandments highlight the importance of a work free day each week where we can focus on God. ## Prep – Year 5 Yachts

This term, our budding engineers have been excitedly engaged with their project-based learning. Through open-ended challenges, students are able to control the direction and pace of their learning. The activities promote investigation and creative, critical thinking where comprehension and application come through concrete experience. Working in their engineering teams, students have come up with new ideas, applied those ideas to create an experience, then observed, reflected and asked questions. Finally, our engineers used their observations to create new ideas and to reflect on their new learning.

Our young Year 2 engineers have explored gears, cogs and wheels as they discovered what drives machines. They worked in teams to design a gear train and share thoughts, questions and ideas on this topic.

After research and group discussions, our Year 3 students created a catapult to launch marshmallows from and test the greatest distance they could achieve. Over the weeks, materials were modified, variables were trialled and tested and adjustments were made accordingly.

Our Year 4 engineers were challenged to design a sturdy structure to span a ravine. This task required the project teams to design, research and make prototype sketches. Amazing bridges were constructed, as students were able to connect, extend and challenge their knowledge as they worked together testing hypotheses and considering variables.

In Year 5, our engineers reflected on the knowledge that 'everything man-made is influenced by engineering'. These students were challenged to design a machine that would rescue or repair in the aftermath of a natural disaster. Through stages of development, project team members expanded their designs, analysed work, evaluated and reflected upon their constructions.

Our Yachts students have been actively engaged with their learning. Sessions were filled with wide smiles, animated discussions and the joy of discovery.

Her time is comparable to Hungarian swimmer Krisztina Egerszegi who is renowned for her performance in girls backstroke (her 200m backstroke record still stands as Hungary's National record for a 13 year old girl. Krisztina also won Gold at the Olympics for backstroke as a 14 year old).
