From the Director of Students

"Why should I be nice to people? They aren't nice to me." This can be a response from adolescents when you discuss with them the notion of being kind.

Research will tell us that because of the adolescent brain, the teaching of such concepts such as kindness need to be demonstrated. Random Acts of Kindness enables students to do things for others and discover that to do something nice for someone is good for them and great for you. For the next three weeks Year 6 and 7 students will be assigned a random secret buddy. Their aim will be to perform one or two acts of kindness for their buddy each week. At the end of the three weeks teachers will survey the students about the experience.

The Pacific community is a place where young people and staff interact in a very kind way. We are a school that helps others who are suffering in a very direct way such as our support of the Red Shield Appeal. Trialling the Random Acts of Kindness at this time will help students focus on their relationships with others in a micro way during this mid-term period.

Along with the Random Acts of Kindness teachers will encourage students to be mindful and speak to one another in a kind way. This means making positive statements that build others up.

Year 9 students are out on their camp this week. This outdoor education experience is a central part of their Rite Journey course. For students to work together in a natural environment builds not only relationships but their own sense of self. The experiences of the week will be followed up in class by the Rite Journey team.

Well done to the Middle/Senior students for presenting some very creative lantern designs for the Ocean Festival. House points will be awarded after the festival for the lantern designs.

From the Head of Staff and Students P-5

The Ben Chambers' Memorial Game was held this Monday. I am happy to report that, in an extremely close game, Year 5C won a round robin competition between the three Year 5 classes. The game, which is played at this time each year between Year 5 students, is held in memory of Ben Chambers who lost his battle with cancer whilst a student in Year 4 at the college. A special thanks to Mr Danny Chambers who makes time each year to be at the game and present the trophy. Thanks also to Ben's sister, Brittany, who attended the games and Mr Hauser who refereed the game.

As next week is *Keep Australia Beautiful*, it is an ideal time of the year to focus on how, as a community, we can reduce our environmental footprint. We are continually reminded about the volume of litter (particularly plastic) polluting our beaches and waterways. According to Coast Care, about 70% of all rubbish in the ocean is originally discarded on land and includes litter washed into the ocean from storm water drains, creeks, rivers and landfill.

The environmental footprint of a school can be quiet large. When a large group of individuals gather daily in the one spot, the environmental implications for water usage, electricity and rubbish generation and disposal can be large. At the college, in an attempt to minimise our environmental impact, initiatives such as collection of rainwater, the generation of electricity through the use of solar panels, a strong emphasis on recycling and supporting sustainable, environmentally friendly forms of travel are important.

The amount of non-recyclable rubbish generated at the college is large. Much of this rubbish is generated from food wrapping associated with student's lunches. Much of this rubbish is plastic which does not readily break down and, unfortunately, can end up being washed into the ocean.

I would encourage parents to consider this when preparing food for lunches and morning teas. As a parent, I appreciate the convenience of snap lock plastic bags, plastic food wraps and fruit juice packed in tetra packs with attached straws wrapped in plastic and food presented in plastic bags.

There are alternatives for replacing much of the plastic used in lunches. Although the use of paper bags is not ideal, paper is certainly preferable to plastic. Re-usable stainless steel water bottles to carry juice in and stainless steel cutlery can be used instead of plastic ones. Re-washable Tupperware like containers are great for storing fruit, yoghurt, spaghetti

and my favorite baked beans in. There is some most informative information on the internet regarding making eco-friendly lunches. Sites such as <http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=CJ9FXCbyUBM> provide practical ideas on making school lunches more environmentally friendly.

If every child's (in Prep - Year 5) lunch contained one less piece of plastic per day, this would equate to over 50,000 pieces of rubbish being removed from the environment annually. Remember every little bit helps.

The end of the 2013 season is quickly approaching and we now have only one round of fixture games remaining, followed by a Rooball carnival for the U6-U10 teams, and the finals series for the competitive teams.

Our spectators enjoyed the glorious weather last weekend, and saw 15 of our teams playing at home.

Our competitive teams generally had close-fought matches, and the results showed the tremendous effort which the players have shown throughout this season.



U11B Pacific Tigerheads played away, against the table-leading Mooloolah Falcons. Although the Falcons took the game 2-0, the Tigerheads deserve enormous credit for their wonderful team performance, and for such a close result.



U12A Pacific Barracudas had a 7-0 win against Nambour Cougar Cats, to remain in second place, one win behind Caloundra Gold.

U13B Pacific Seahorses played second place Caloundra Red, and we saw an exciting and even game, with scoring opportunities for both sides. The Seahorses were level with Caloundra for most of the game, and were unfortunate to just miss the points, with the final score 3-2 to Caloundra.



U13B Pacific Marlins played the table-leading Palmwoods Titans, and were down 0-1 at half-time. The Titans continued the pressure in the second half, but the Marlins not only kept them out, they also managed to score, to level the game.

The Marlins finished the game strongly with more scoring opportunities, but the final 1-1 score was probably a fair result, against such a strong team.

The draw between the Marlins and the Palmwoods Titans has caused an upset at the top of the table. Despite a much better goal difference, the Palmwoods Titans are now in second place, two points behind Caloundra Red, with only one game remaining.




