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## Daily Bread

### September 11 - The Day of the Listening Heart

I am writing this reflection on September 11<sup>th</sup>. This is the day that many people in the USA, and around the world, recall the horrific attack of 2001 that destroyed life and property in the World Trade Towers, the Pentagon and the other plane that crashed.

Since that day, there have been over 150,000 deaths in Iraq, with the majority being civilians. Only yesterday, another 22 people died in a bomb explosion.

What can bring world peace? The Bible speaks of a "listening heart". This is what the great King Solomon asked God to give him one day, when the Lord appeared to him in a dream. Solomon could have asked for riches, fame and glory, but he

asked for the ability to discern between good and evil, so that people could live in peace and have good lives.

Whilst honoring the grief and pain of those who lost loved ones on September 11, I also wish that September 11 could become known as a "listening heart" day. Each year, it would benefit the world if we recalled what happened that day and then consider what would ensure peace in our time: to distinguish justice from revenge; to prefer reconciliation over retribution; to pursue peace by asking what is God's way.

When King Solomon asked for a "listening heart" he was asking for Godly wisdom. It is interesting that the Bible tells us that all those other things that Solomon could have asked for: fame, glory, prosperity - all came to Solomon because of his wisdom.

We pray, "Lord, Give us eyes that discern the good. Give us ears to perceive deceit. Give us hearts that listen ever more deeply that our words and our actions may be your ways of justice, mercy and peace. In Jesus' name. Amen."

Renewable energy is power that can be used over and over again.





