# Success

Education is not just about going to school and learning your ABCs, as our 2022 Seniors demonstrated. This cohort instead showcased diverse learning journeys. They highlighted a rich array of social, emotional, and spiritual development, while at the same time pursuing strong academic pathways. As Malcom X noted, nearly sixty years ago: education plays an important role in preparing students for a world outside the safety of the classroom and schoolyard. Education is clearly more than the acquisition of knowledge, it is a transformative journey that provides access to a successful future. Malcolm X reference to a 'passport' highlights the world of possibilities that education opens up for students as they over time, develop skills and attributes that will empower them to navigate their future and seize opportunities that lie ahead.

Students within the graduating class of 2022 clearly made excellent inroads into their academic future with a number of studentsachievingsignificantacademic accomplishments. In the cohort of 76 students, 82% were eligible for an ATAR and 93% were eligible to apply for a university place. Furthermore, 50% of this group achieved a rank over 80; however, most noteworthy, was that 99% of the cohort received either a VET qualification or their Queensland Certificate of Education.

Our Scholars' Assembly in Term 1 provided us with an opportunity to reflect upon and congratulate a remarkable group of individuals who exemplified academic diligence and commitment to their studies. We were delighted to have Noah Beasley, 2021 College Captain and Dux, attend and provide students with an inspirational message for academic success. Noah, in collaboration with Dr Dolling, also presented the highly esteemed 2022 Dux to Noah Winten, who was the top student in three subjects: Specialist Maths, English Literature and Extension, and Mathematical Methods. Noah

achieved an outstanding ATAR of 99.90, demonstrating exceptional dedication and mastery of his chosen subjects. Alongside Noah, Jasmin Groves was recognised as the 2022 Proxime Accessit, showcasing remarkable prowess as the highest-ranking student in four general subjects: Biology, Chemistry, English, and Music. Jasmin's academic achievements were further highlighted by her distinction as the top student in Christian Studies.

This assembly served as an opportunity to acknowledge these exceptional individuals and the significant academic success of 14 students that received ATARs over 90, the individual students that topped specific subjects, and the five 2022 graduates awarded university scholarships. Specifically, Noah Winten received the Vice Chancellor's Scholarship at the University of Queensland, Jasmin Groves and Samantha Hutton were awarded the Thompson Excellence Scholarship at University of the Sunshine Coast (UniSC), Charles Box was awarded the Corporate Partners in Excellence Scholarship at Oueensland University of Technology (QUT) and Liam Russell secured the prestigious Sir Samuel Griffith Scholarship with Griffith University.

We were delighted that Ms Jodie Brocks from Griffith University, Ms Jamison Kehl from UniSC. Ms Carolyn Kirk from QUT, and Mr Andrew Bannerman from UQ were able to attend the assembly and present our scholarship recipients with certificates and official recognition of their remarkable achievements. We were also immensely thankful to the universities for spending time postevent, to enlighten our current Year 12 cohort about the various scholarships available to them, as well as the countless opportunities and benefits that these awards provide.

Through their academic diligence, each of the scholar ship winners and the Senior students honoured, demonstrated their pursuit of learning through their perseverance, determination, and a thirst for knowledge setting a high stand of excellence.

## International Future Problem Solving and Competition Mrs Jo Belchamber,

Head of Learning Middle College

In 2022 a team of four Middle College students from Pacific Lutheran College achieved second place at the National Finals of the Future Problem Solving program in Melbourne. This success secured them an invitation to the International Conference in the United States at the University of Massachusetts in June 2023.

The PLC Future Problem Solving team, comprising of Emily Studiman (Year 10), Oliver Friend (Year 9), Isla Lendrum (Year 9) and Amy Richards (Year 8), has recently returned from a hugely enjoyable experience at the International Conference where they participated in two competitions and a wide variety of other conference workshops and activities. High achieving students from all over the world including the United States, Turkey, Singapore, China, Canada and New Zealand participated in this very prestigious academic challenge. Students competing in the Global Issues Problem Solving division were required to respond to an unseen scenario set in 2052 on the future topic of currency. In two





hours, the team needed to act collaboratively to identify challenges in this scenario, formulate an underlying problem, generate 16 solutions and select one of these to prepare an action plan. The plan needed to overcome the challenges of competing cryptocurrencies and the impact on the residents of the future global tourist resort of Trinidad and Tobago. Two accompanying Year 7 students, Fletcher Friend and William Studiman, were placed in multi-affiliate teams and completed a booklet with students from around the world in the multi-affiliate division. The following day, all six students were required to prepare a presentation of their action plan as a creative and entertaining skit in which they were also required to improvise and incorporate some quotes and props in a creative fashion.

The team wrote an outstanding booklet in which their solution incorporated establishing clean water as a sustainable reserve currency for the government's centralised cryptocurrency. They incentivised the residents of Trinidad and Tobago to favour the government's centralised cryptocurrency, as opposed to a deregulated and decentralised cryptocurrency, with tax breaks and proposed gamification to improve awareness of the benefits of a unified cryptocurrency.

The International Conference took place over four days and included many opportunities for cultural exchange. Pacific students participated in all of these activities with enthusiasm, sharing Australian souvenirs with students from other countries at the memento exchange, and participating in improvisation and project management workshops. They attended a variety show and a dance with students representing other nationalities. A community problem solving fair enabled them to see samples of international student projects developed to benefit communities from many countries.

The International Conference was an exciting and challenging way for participants to develop leadership skills including the ability to collaboratively solve problems using creativity, innovation, research and optimism. Before and after the competition, the students all embarked on sightseeing experiences including New York City, Toronto, Vancouver, Boston and Los Angeles. The International Conference was an exciting and memorable experience for the entire team. "The Future Problem Solving International Conference was an extraordinary experience that had a lasting impact on the team. The knowledge we gained and the remarkable individuals we met went beyond our expectations. The Conference allowed us to engage with both like-minded peers and those with contrasting perspectives who opened our minds to new ideas and concepts. FPSI showcased the immense potential for positive change when diverse and young minds unite. Throughout the conference there were a range of fun and enriching activities and workshops as well as the competition, which allowed us to interact with people from many different countries. We also heard from people who have previously participated in Future Problem Solving as they spoke about how they have used their future problem solving skills in their life and careers. My highlight of the trip was meeting a range of different people from all over the world and creating lasting connections. I am so grateful to have had this opportunity. Our memories of this incredible event will stay with us long into the future and forever inspire us to strive to achieve our full potential."

# **J Block** Building Dedication and Opening



On Thursday 28<sup>th</sup> April 2023, we were delighted to welcome the Honourable Andrew Wallace, Member for Fisher, the Honourable Jason Hunt Member for Caloundra representing the Honourable Grace Grace MP, Minister for Education, Executive Director of Lutheran Education Queensland, Mrs Tanya Crooks, local Councilor Mr Peter Cox, our architects from Bickerton Masters, Principals from Sunshine Coast Schools, College Council Members and representatives of the Friends of Pacific to join with us to celebrate the Dedication and Opening of our new Year 3 and 4 learning spaces.

It was a special moment for us as a College community to invite Dr Richard Hauser to open the building and for Bishop Dr Mark Vainikka to dedicate the new spaces. During the building dedication and opening, we expressed our appreciation to the State Government for their provision of \$1.6m with the College contributing just under \$3.7m to the project. The new building includes six general learning spaces with large adjoining withdrawal spaces that support young people to take responsibility for their learning. The new spaces connect to our existing Year 5 space and we have seen Year 3, 4 and 5 staff and students revel as they have enjoyed the opportunity to develop contemporary learning skills and ways of being and thinking as they have grown across the Four Pillars.







## **RAP** Program

During Term 2 we celebrated National Reconciliation Week, where communities across Australia paused to learn more about a shared history, culture and achievement and to reflect on the role each of us plays in working toward reconciliation with First Nations People.

Reconciliation is the strengthening of relationships with indigenous groups to benefit all. This year's theme of "Be a voice for generations" is a challenge for all Australians to make a concerted effort to address the unfinished business of reconciliation for greater prosperity and connection.


Reconciliation Week begins with National Sorry Day. National Sorry Day was a momentous moment for this country and modelled taking responsibility for the past actions of others. It acknowledged that policies aimed at First Nations Peoples had a detrimental and long-lasting generational impact.

As a College, Reconciliation Week provided an opportunity for reflection and how we, as individuals and community, can begin to move toward truth-telling and strengthen relationships between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples and non-Indigenous People. It allowed people to obtain a greater understanding of the rich history of this land and the intricate stories embedded within it, both new and old.

Lutheran Pastor Chad Rimmer speaks of a God that has two moves, to create and to reconcile. Beginning to understand this inherent relationship in reconciliation is essential and he writes, "Seeing the way God reconciles Creation in Christ equips us to see God's Spirit at work restoring creation today. Faith gives us the eyes to see beauty among the broken. Faith gives us the eyes to see healing among the hurt. Faith gives us eyes to see the mutuality among the multitude of creatures, great and small."

Whilst attending the Year 4 Outdoor Education Program at Mapleton during May, I was privileged to listen to local Kabi Kabi Elder Mr Kerry Neill speak of new and old connections. The wind on your face, the sun on your back, is a connection. Some of these connections are new; others are ancient; regardless, it is a connection. With that connection comes responsibility. We all have a connection to this country and as a result, God's creation. The connected nature of creation and reconciliation is in action every day within our environment and with each other and we are asked to reflect on how we may make this creation better tomorrow than it was today.


One such tool to build a better knowledge of Reconciliation is the development of a Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP). A RAP is a framework for organisations to realise their vision for engaging well with First Nations People and creating positive pathways and processes for people. To better understand the path to reconciliation in our unique context, staff and students continue constructing our own College Reconciliation Action Plan. Our hope is that as a College, we begin to understand the road to reconciliation better and what steps our community can take toward greater clarity and engagement with Indigenous knowledge. Our vision for reconciliation action acknowledges and honours the rich heritage, culture, and contributions of the Kabi Kabi people as the traditional custodians of the land, and we seek to promote authentic relationships built on trust, mutual respect, and shared responsibility. We recognise the importance of listening and truthtelling as we walk and work together towards reconciliation.

## Our Refined Image of Child at **Pacific Early Learning**

One of our key mantras in our Early Learning community is They write their own names at the top of the page to identify upholding our shared Image of Child in everything that we who is working on the big idea and plan what resources they do: "every day, every time, every educator and every child". It may need to support their play. At the bottom of the page, positions children as central to all that we do and influences children make a mark or write their names to show they give the decisions that are made including rituals, routines, permission for their plan to be shared. Children can then add practices and environments. to other plans or revisit their own, promoting a collaborative learning environment.

As a professional team, educators have recently done some deep reflections on our current Image of Child and have chosen to refine it to the below statement:

#### Children are curious and resourceful learners, with the capacity to make socially responsible choices that respect the perspective of others.

With this in mind, we have introduced forest play to the Senior studio. Each Monday, weather permitting, Studio 2 ventures across to the College to explore the forest environment and its surrounds. This includes the forest, labyrinth and College oval. The thinking and learning that support forest play includes a look at animals and plants of the forest, and concepts such as habitats, decomposition, pollution and what it means to be socially responsible. Forest play supports many Early Years Learning Framework (EYLF) and Queensland Kindergarten Learning Guideline (KLG) outcomes, including supporting children's strong sense of identity, connecting children with their world, helping them develop a strong sense of physical and emotional wellbeing, encouraging confident and involved learning and facilitating both verbal and non-verbal communication.

We regularly reflect on this statement and chosen words to see what this looks like in practice. At weekly team meetings, educators discuss the evidence that they have collected to support our vision of children as curious, respectful and resourceful learners. We also robustly discuss and identify areas where this vision may not be being upheld and strategies to create positive change. In Studio 1, as part of our "think, say, plan, do" process the children are encouraged to share their big ideas at the morning meeting, and then work in small groups to begin recording their thinking. We have recently introduced a planning template. This planning structure encourages children to accept others into their play and to work together.

#### Learning environments are vibrant and flexible spaces that are responsive to the interests and abilities of each child. They cater for different learning capacities and learning styles and invite children to contribute ideas, interests and questions.

## Power of Music

The Pacific Music program has a powerful impact on students' cognitive, emotional, and social development. Learning music has proven to enhance academic performance, foster creativity, promote cultural appreciation and instill valuable life skills. Pacific Music teachers, tutors and support staff encourage students to nurture their artistic talents and establish a lifelong appreciation and engagement with music.

Sixty Pacific Senior Music students began the year collaborating at the Senior Ensembles Music Camp in Dakain. The weekend was spent working creatively with peers across Pacific's eighteen ensemble groups to explore and compose music for the year ahead. It was a great opportunity for students to listen to each other through music and voice and prioritise their learning goals for each term.

Music created by Pacific students so far this year has made a powerful impact across our community. # Outdoor Education – A Positive First **Experience**

At Pacific, we value the opportunity to engage in learning while immersed in natural environments. Our rich and rewarding Outdoor Education Program has always been a critical element of Pacific's learning philosophy, a compulsory component of the Years 3-9 curriculum. Last year the program was extended to include Year 2 where, through nature play students learnt about themselves, acquired skills to work with others and developed environmental awareness.

Following the success of the Year 2 Outdoor Education experience to Chambers Island, this year, in Term 1, Year 1 were presented with the opportunity to engage in their very first outdoor learning experience at Pacific.

Across three days in March, our Year 1 students, in their respective classes, participated in an Outdoor Learning Day which connected their constructed and natural environment curriculum with our local environment through an authentic learning experience at Buderim Forest Park.

Connected to nature and presented with experiential learning opportunities, the students explored their natural surroundings to build shelters using tree branches, participated in a scavenger hunt, hiked to the Buderim Waterfall and jumped across the river rocks. By being exposed to the natural world, students developed a greater appreciation and understanding of the environment and experienced a positive first Outdoor Education Program at Pacific.

During Term 2, the team of enthusiastic kayakers received 12 new Pacific branded kayaks with paddles. The addition of our new equipment places the PLC Kayak program in a very healthy position for upcoming training and competition. The program is wellsupported and resourced, amassing an impressive fleet of over 80 kayaks. The new equipment now allows students to represent the College in doubles, singles and K4 events over 200, 500 and 1000m and compete in the new K1, C1 and C2 boats.

Our kayakers train at a world class venue at Kawana and are coached by Mr Gary Graves, PLC Kayaking Coordinator along with Mr Mark Rantel, Specialist Technique Coach. Mark was a world-class kayaker in both doubles and singles competitions, winning Australian K2 Marathon titles and representing Australia at the World Marathon Championships on two occasions. Student Kayakers and coaches have worked hard to prepare for the School Marathon Competition at the end of Term 2 where PLC was named the Champion School. # **Micro:bits** Creating Innovative **Digital Experiences**

This year, students in Year 8 had the opportunity to engage with the latest micro:bits and kitronik cars to learn fundamental programming techniques and life-long skills in developing and creating innovative digital solutions. The culminating activity was to produce a remote-control bumper buggy system that incorporated several techniques to adhere to game rules. This included the use of wireless communication to remotely control buggies, recognising and responding to a playing arena using a colour sensor, and recognising and responding to other buggies using electrical circuits, lights, sound, and a scoring system.

As these pocket-sized computers continue to develop at a fast pace, a range of new accessories become available, enabling students to engage in the development of a broad range of creative solutions that incorporate the use of sensors, motors, lights, and wireless communication. It is hoped that continued engagement with these micro-computers will help students develop a range of in-demand digital skills as reported by the National Skills Commission (2021), including but not limited to artificial intelligence (AI), IT Automation, Internet of Things Application Programming (IoT),

Interfaces (API), big data, and increased capabilities and confidence in the use of computers and a range of software applications.

Due to increased student interest in the micro:bits, Pacific recently purchased the Sparkfun Micro:climate kit which encapsulates a DIY weather station. This kit provides students with an opportunity to extend their learning and understanding of how digital solutions can be applied in a real-world situation. The kit allows the measurement of temperature, humidity, pressure, light, soil moisture/temperature, wind direction/speed, and rain. Furthermore, the additional use of a microSD card will allow for the collection of this data, which can then be transported and prepared for further analysis and interpretation using graphs.

Students have chosen to participate with this new technology during lunchbreaks, with the hope of collecting data to gain a better understanding of the weather patterns experienced in our local environment. We are excited to see students contribute and collaborate during this enriching learning opportunity and continue to look forward to other prospects that align with student interests and realworld applications of digital solutions.

## **Emulating Hands** Year 10 STEM Students Excel in Bionics and Prosthetics Unit

Pacific Lutheran College continues to foster an environment of innovation and excellence in STEM education. In line with our commitment to providing authentic learning experiences, this year our Year 10 STEM students embarked on an exciting journey to enhance their understanding of bionics and prosthetics.

As part of their capstone unit, titled "Emulating Hands," students explored the integration of life science with robotics while developing crucial 21st century technical skills. Through this immersive activity, students gained a deeper appreciation for the combination of science and technology to reflect the mechanics of the human body.

The "Emulating Hands" activity aimed to integrate various disciplines, including life science, robotics, data science, software engineering, and mechanical and electrical engineering. By bringing together these diverse fields, students were able to develop a holistic understanding of bionics and prosthetics.

To begin their exploration, students built a sensor-enabled glove that measured flexion and extension, emulating the movement of a human finger. This glove was connected to an Arduino Uno microcontroller, which served as the interface between the glove and a customised Excel workbook. The students leveraged the graphics capabilities in Excel to visualise and analyse the real-time data input from the sensor-enabled glove.

By running trials with the sensor-enabled glove and a robotic hand, students generated ideas to improve the range of tasks the robotic hand could accomplish. The customised Excel workbook provided a dynamic platform for data analysis, allowing students to analyse the collected data on the fly. This integration of technology and data science empowered students to refine their designs and make informed decisions about enhancing the functionality of the prosthetic hand.

By connecting their sensor-enabled glove to an Arduino Uno microcontroller and a customised Excel workbook, students gained a comprehensive understanding of the constructive collaboration between the three outcomes. The Excel workbook allowed them to explore the potential of utilising data visualisation and real-time analysis to improve the performance and adaptability of their prosthetic devices.


Through hands-on experience with the Arduino Uno microcontroller and an Excel workbook, students developed technical proficiency in sensor integration, data collection, and data analysis. Also, they acquired practical skills in programming, data visualisation, and utilising software tools to drive innovation in bionics and prosthetics.

The activity allowed our students to run trials and analyse real-time data. This in turn enabled our students to think critically and innovatively about improving the range of tasks the robotic hand could perform. They learned to identify patterns, make data-driven decisions, and propose creative solutions to enhance the functionality of prosthetic devices.

The collaborative nature of the project fostered effective teamwork and communication among students. They worked together to troubleshoot technical challenges, share insights, and exchange ideas, fostering essential skills for future collaborative endeavors.

The "Emulating Hands" capstone unit displayed the dedication and enthusiasm of our Year 10 STEM students at Pacific Lutheran College. Through their commitment to integrating life science with robotics and data analysis, students embarked on a journey of discovery, enhancing their understanding of bionics and prosthetics. By developing essential technical skills and nurturing a passion for STEM, our students are well-equipped for future challenges and opportunities.

At Pacific Lutheran College, we remain committed to providing a nurturing environment that encourages innovation and excellence in STEM education. The "Emulating Hands" activity exemplifies our dedication to fostering authentic learning experiences that prepare our students for a world driven by science and technology. 


#### How it works

Students earn points by reflecting on their participation in a wide range of extra-curricular activities, grouped into four categories that are all directly related to employability:

When they reach benchmarks for both quantum and diversity of their activities, students may apply for Beyond Pacific Employability Awards at 3 levels: Bronze, Silver and Gold. In their application, students are asked to make connections between the activities they have participated in, and their development of core transferable skills that are valued in the workplace.

## **Celebrating** 10 Year Reunion

#### Can you share your study and career accomplishments since graduating from Pacific Lutheran College ten years ago?

Following graduation from PLC, I moved to Sydney and studied a Bachelor of Engineering (Materials Science and Engineering) at UNSW. During this degree, I was fortunate to complete a year-long exchange at Luleå University of Technology in Sweden, just south of the Arctic Circle. After completing my bachelor's degree, I began working as a Graduate Metallurgist in Sydney. I found this work fascinating, designing, and developing new metal alloys with improved properties for various applications.

**Reflecting on my time** at Pacific, I'm most proud of how I applied myself during my years at PLC.

However, after two years in this role, I began thinking about how many of the procedures and processes were lagging and could be drastically improved by integrating new technologies. Whilst exploring some of these alternatives, I had a fortuitous meeting with my now supervisor. I decided to head back to university and moved to Melbourne to pursue a PhD in Mechanical Engineering from the University of Melbourne.

I have now successfully defended my thesis on the "Computational Design of Alternate Binders for Tungsten Carbide Hardmetals", where I developed a design methodology which uses multi-objective optimisation with reduced order models and evolutionary algorithms to reduce the number of experimental trials needed in new alloy development.

#### What are you most proud of from your Pacific Lutheran College experience?

Reflecting on my time at Pacific, I'm most proud of how I applied myself during my years at PLC. I was busy (sometimes even to my own detriment). Often there was barely a lunch break left where I could squeeze in some handball. But I can honestly say I extracted as much as possible from the diverse opportunities presented throughout my PLC years. From musicals and bands to kayaking and whitewater rafting in New Zealand, even Travelling to South Africa as part of a National Youth Science Forum, the breadth of experiences were vast.

#### What advice do you have for Pacific students as they prepare for Semester 2?

All the current students have already shown how incredibly dexterous and adaptable young people are. My encouragement (as I still feel too young at heart to be giving advice) for students would be to take the plunge and try something new or re-engage with an activity that may have fallen by the wayside. Engaging remotely is more accepted and accessible than ever. However, what will distinguish your journey in the years ahead are the personal connections you have made and the communities you have contributed to. But even more so, the ones you are willing to engage with in the future.

I now work for The Banyans' parent company, Sana Health Group, and am incredibly proud to be part of an organisation that has a commitment to providing high guality behavioural healthcare, education around wellbeing, addiction, and mental health, and reducing barriers to receiving quality care. 
